In Virginia, obtaining a motorcycle license requires completing a driver education program or basic rider course before applying for any license. This is distinct from the state's Rider Training Program. The UMV fee of \$500 must be paid, but if it is not, then mandatory insurance coverage is required. The minimum required insurance coverages are \$25,000 in bodily injury per person and \$50,000 total bodily injury per accident, as well as \$20,000 in property damage per accident. Additionally, all motorcyclists must possess Uninsured/Underinsured Bodily Injury coverage with a minimum of \$25,000 per person and \$50,000 per accident. Motorcycle operators must also wear protective gear such as helmets that meet specific requirements, and lane splitting is not permitted.
