- 4]Click the group you want to join. This will open the main page for the group. You'll be able to see a biography, group type, rules, and more information.
- 5]Click Join Group. This will be located underneath the group's profile picture.
- 12]6]Select your email settings. Before joining the group, you'll be asked to set your group discussion email settings.
- 13]Digest will send all comments on group discussions bundled in a weekly or daily email.Individual Email will send an email instantly when there is a new topic or reply.Notification only won't send any emails, just notifications about group discussions.None won't send any notifications.

Nevertheless, I jumped into The List App and helped to make it a bookish place, sharing lists of my favorite reading-related podcasts and facilitating group lists where we could share what we were reading each week.A couple of years later, in September 2017, we got the email many of us had been sensing was inevitable. The List App, having undergone multiple reincarnations and been rechristened Li.st, was closing just three days later. Is it possible to be astonished and yet at the same time not surprised? Those of us with a propensity to quote The West Wing might have said, "We seen it coming, but it was still unbearably sad.Its hard to explain what this app meant to many of us that was a community more than an app, a place more supportive than anything Id come to expect online. Several of us have found each other online elsewhere Facebook, Twitter, even Slack but BJ Novak and his team trained us to think in lists, and we missed making them together and sharing them with each other.Three years later, we still gather in a Facebook group, still mourn the loss of The List App, and weve Zoomed a few times during these weird times when people have been reaching out to their friends and communities for some semblance of much-needed connectionAnd although its not the same, there are other places online to make and share bookish lists lists like 5 books that made me laugh or novels I recommend to everyone or my favourite Spain-set books. 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
